Framing the *Alternative*:

transformative discourses, social movements and the mobilization of active minorities

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Deepening **confluence of crises** (Steffen *et al.*, 2007; Steffen *et al.*, 2015; Bordo *et al.*, 2001)

Rising **call for structural change** that catalyses societal transformations towards **sustainability** has appeared concurrently with - or seemingly as a result of - the predominant neo-liberal capitalist, productivity- and growth-led hegemonic worldview (Haque, 1999; McMichael, 2010; Lorek and Spangenberg, 2014).

Which Change? Conceptualization and *Practices* of Change – Framing the Alternative





What is Alternative?

Objective: develop a transversal literature review (social practices, transition studies, transformative adaptation) focusing on processes of inception, consolidation and generalization of *anti-hegemonic practices*.

Explore the *multiple meanings* of Alternative...words can have many uses and often have radical, reformist, neoliberal versions ... eg: Empowerment (Bacqué and Biewener, 2013)





Limits to Alternatives

The "iron cage" of neoliberalism; being an entrepreneur of oneself (Brown, 1997, Dardot and Laval, 2010) « *Il est plus facile de s'évader d'une prison que de sortir d'une rationalité* »

The absorption of critical discourses by capitalism (Boltanski and Chiapello, 1999) – TINA, liberal democracy and "end of history". Weakening of alternative narratives Governance and *Post-Politics* (Crouch, 2013). Avoidance of conflict by consensus...

Gateways for Alternatives

Active minorities (Moscovici, 1979) and dissemination of new values in society. Experimentation with new ways of living, producing, organizing.
