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1. Food (in)security: definition and history


Food Insecurity

- Exists when people lack secure access to sufficient amounts of safe and nutritious food for normal growth and development and an active, healthy life.
- Caused by the unavailability of food, insufficient purchasing power or the inappropriate distribution or inadequate use of food at the household level.
- May be chronic, seasonal or transitory.

Food Security

• Exists when all people, at all times, have physical, social and economic access to sufficient, safe and nutritious food that meets their dietary needs and food preferences for an active and healthy life.
